

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MIDWAY ARTS CELEBRATES SUCCESS

On March 12, the community gathered to celebrate the success of Midway Arts in Coatesville. The ribbon cutting was organized through the Western Chester County Chamber of Commerce and the Coatesville 2nd Century Alliance. Visitors strolled through the building for a behind the scenes glimpse into the creative and unique working space. Mark Lane Properties bought the property, commonly known as the old Lipkins warehouse and has since transformed the building into a space for the creative class to come together to collaborate, build upon their knowledge and grow their trade.

"We arrived in Coatesville being outsiders but quickly discovered the wonderful people here. The progression at Midway Arts is about you and the tenants that have faith in us. We have reached 50 percent occupancy in less than a year; presently we have 19 tenants," said Mark Sherman of Mark Lane Properties.

Lane Udis of Midway Arts added that they are now entering phase 2 of construction, including a new elevator, a renovated entrance with keyless fob entry and a new lobby area alongside more progression plans to come.

It turned out that Jonathan Wright didn't have to look any further than his own backyard for his perfect career. The owner of Downingtown's The Wright Agency may have dabbled in a tech start-up after college, but in the end he came back home to the family business.

He sold the business to Jonathan's grandmother, a teacher, who worked it for supplemental income in the summer. She sold it to Jonathan's father, John, and The Wright Agency, as we know it, was officially born in 1977. Both John and his wife, Fran, are fully retired now.

"We're still serving some families that date back to my great-grandfather's original book of business!" Jonathan added. "And, we're still an insurance agency for families, with a specialty in small businesses, especially families that run a business. We understand how it works because that's what we do. We can insure your home, cars and business needs — one phone call can handle it all."

Many of The Wright Agency customers are those who are interested in doing business locally. Jonathan continues, "we're about relationship and quality first. There's always a cheaper policy somewhere, but we love working with people who want a great product and a great service. We've earned that trust."



Jonathan has been an active member and long-time sponsor of the Western Chester Chamber of Commerce since 2006; the agency is a current Platinum Partner. He highly recommends Chamber membership to local businesses looking to grow, but especially to those getting started. He says he "grew up in the Chamber" by getting involved and going to events where he honed his public speaking and networking skills.

Jonathan has served on most committees and was the 2015 Board president. He's currently the chair of the Young Professionals Committee and is a member of the Membership Committee. "People ask me, 'Why join the Chamber?' I say, 'Why not!' It's a great place to meet people and build your business," he explained. "It's the perfect platform for small- to medium-sized businesses to do things they might not be able to do on a larger scale on their own such as advertising; with the Chamber, you can advertise and promote your business in the newsletter, the magazine, on the website and through social media."

Jonathan adds that you have to use your membership to get the most from the Chamber. "Create your brand, network, go to a SCORE workshop, join a committee and take advantage of all we have to offer. There are few barriers to entry: It's a few hundred bucks and then just show up."

His wife, Maria, is a licensed agent who is involved with the agency when she's not taking care of their children Camila, 4, and Jonathan Jr. (JJ), who was born in June 2019. Dwayne has developed a strong rapport in the community, being invited to speak at more than a dozen churches, conferences, and schools annually. Most recently, Dwayne was awarded the "Give Gratitude Community Service Award" from a national radio station and was invited to Octorara High School to discuss racism and to speak at the Coatesville Youth Conference about, "succeeding in school while struggling at home". Dwayne's wisdom, education, character and passion has been instrumental in The POINT's continued growth.

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CCEDC Announces New Equipment Leasing Program

The Chester County Economic Development Council has introduced a new financing program that allows businesses to acquire a wide range of critical equipment such as computers, lab equipment, and machinery without a large cash outlay. Under the new offering, businesses may finance equipment valued up to \$100,000, or upgrade existing equipment, without affecting existing lines of credit. In response to the challenges facing the community the Brandywine Health Foundation has created a \$350,000 Healthcare and Economic Relief Fund. In support of the health and welfare of the community, BHF canceled plans to hold its annual Garden Party, which raises funds each year in support of its continued operation. This year's Garden Party sponsors decided to donate their contributions to the new Healthcare and Economic Relief Fund. In addition, dozens of individuals throughout Chester County have already contributed to the foundation, a total of \$50,000 to initiate the Foundation's first match commitment of \$50,000. This first round of funds will allow BHF to deploy a total of \$100,000 of rapid response grants. Grants will be distributed on a rolling basis and range from approximately \$5,000 to \$15,000 each. Legislative Roundtable Tackles Local Issues

Recently, WCCCC held our annual Legislative Roundtable at Pope John Paul II Regional Catholic Elementary School. The event hosts elected officials and leaders to participate in a question and answer discussion with local business owners. Topics discussed included access to safe drinking water, open space preservation, charter school funding, funding for transportation and property taxes. Chamber President Alissa Griffith expressed that the event is meant to serve as an opportunity for local officials to become more aware of the concerns of their constituents.

Commissioner Moskowitz encouraged municipalities to work together to address open space initiatives as the county forecasts substantial growth in the next decade. She explained that the Commissioners do not control zoning issues as they are determined individually by municipalities.

Representative Hennessey stated he will continue to seek input from the Transportation Management Association of Chester County and the Planning Commission to determine funding for infrastructure and transportation.

Inequality in education was addressed at the event. Representative Dan Williams said his office encourages investment not only in brick and mortar, but investing in the people of our communities. Representative Lawrence also touched on the need to address funding for the State Police and the proper allocation of the gas tax.





Time to Start Your Victory Over Virus Garden By: Tony Buck



Food security must now be on the minds of Chester County residents during this Coronavirus outbreak. And it's about time! According to the Delaware Valley Region Planning Commission Food Study, we grow about 6 percent of our food in the Greater Philadelphia area. Most of our food comes from California in our spring and summer,

and during fall and winter, from south of the equator.


We have a unique opportunity to relocalize the food system here in Chester County. Readers old enough to remember can recall the Victory Gardens of WW2, when everyone was encouraged to grow food in their backyards.

"Sow the seeds of victory, plant and raise your own vegetables," reads one poster from that era. "Grow vitamins at your kitchen door," reads another and people responded. Estimates are that Americans grew about 40 percent of produce needs for that time.

Perhaps one silver lining is that the virus hit just as we, who already grow food, are preparing our gardens for spring. For those who have never tried, I'd say, what a great time to start. There is so much good information on Youtube that within a few hours of checking out the best of the tutors, you'll have an idea of what to do. Just consider starting with a 4-by-8-foot area and plant things like tomatoes and cucumbers. You can start from seedlings (young plants), that give you a better start. You've got plenty of time to learn and prepare because you can't plant these tropicals, as we call them, until about May 10, after the last frost.

You can plant some things earlier if you're ready, like potatoes and snap peas. I typically grow about 20 different edible plants a year in my garden, and I'll tell you something, plants want to grow, they don't have an attitude! So give it a try, and who knows, you might like it and want to scale up and become one of our new 10-acre family farmers, linking in to the \$49 billion local food system and making us all more healthy and secure. 
Cutting Edge Leadership - John P. Wodehouse, Penn State Extension

How to Cultivate Courage, Commitment, and Candor

Turn to your trusty character virtues and use them wisely as framework for your leadership legacy. They will help with empowering others and they will leave a lasting day-to-day positive impact on those around you. If you are a person trying to gain insights into how to increase the level of enduring impact you have with your people, try to portray courage, commitment, and candor as your prime go-to foundational virtues.

Cheer on the first follower. Why does the term leadership get all limelight, when it seems to me the extraordinary followers are the ones really getting things done? This is not the case all the time. We need leaders and we need followers. Nothing in business is pure white or jet black. Think of leaders as builders that need leaders themselves. They build and empower people with the words, actions and the behaviors they emulate (from their own mentors) and then share with you.

So, how do you go from great builder (leader) to high-impact, master-leader with your given abilities? One moment at a time and one action at a time. It is the repetition of your little actions one by one that builds your reputation as a confident leader.

Did you start out instantly as a great leader? I would think not. You likely learned along the way that leadership is an evolution, a journey. It starts by first holding yourself to high standards and leading yourself from within by embracing character virtues such as courage, commitment, and candor.

Courage is an attribute of good character. We all desire more of it in challenging times. Courage leads to resiliency, which as you know in leadership is a necessity. The grit needed to keep trying again and again is courageousness. Courage empowers you to believe in going with your heart while influencing others to go with you, both in and out of the office. Courage is a must when communicating new or different ideas to the team, pitching that product idea or approaching potential new markets or clients. As an admirable trait, courage enables full obligation and dedication toward undertakings whether in sun or in storm.

Commitment is locking in on transforming a strongly believed-in promise into reality. Highly committed people make the time necessary to carry out (or do) whatever it takes to do whatever it was that was promised. Strengthening a commitment to leadership involves a day in and day out pledge to improving the internal cultural climate by eliminating potential roadblocks and obstacles in the workplace that might enable workers to abscond from taking on new commitments. Provide employees with endless flows of learning opportunities to improve their existing abilities and/or learn new skills.

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Coach, or provide coaching, and really encourage the notion of taking on new projects without the fear of failure. Have employees draft a mini career development plan to take the guess work out of the talents and skills that they want to improve. They say happy employees are productive employees. I add to that, dedicated employees are courageous in their own right, which leads to an internal culture that values communication and uninhibited information flow.

Candor is communicating in an honest open and sincere manor. It is not a hall pass for you or your followers to act as critiques. To me, the true meaning of candor is to speak openly and honestly no matter how tough the subject matter is yet still remain tempered and professional even while under duress all-the-while by not hurting someone's pride. To build candor in people and in your organization, move from a command and control environment to an environment of empowerment and trust. Cultivate a culture that values and embraces good communication upstream and downstream. Make work fun and keep the working environment interesting.

Encourage intellectual curiosity in your people and make our time flexible so that you may have meaningful communications with others. Candor is a key element to successful change management. To inspire change, encourage your people, even with their different personalities, to feel safe and welcomed to develop and share their own alternative perspectives.

We need leaders and we need followers. One cannot exist without the other. As I said, nothing with concerns to leadership is pure white or jet black. There are a million shades of each and there is no one catch-all leadership style that works all the time. However, next time you are in charge, take the time to empower the courage, commitment and candor of your people and they will believe in you and together you all will journey and grow into a more prosperous future.
